

Royal Society Vice-Presidents

The President of the Royal Society, Professor P. M. S. BLACKETT, has appointed the following, among others, vice-presidents for the year ending 30 November: Sir Ashley MILES, biological secretary of the Royal Society, director of the Lister Institute, and professor of experimental pathology at London University; and Dr. R. D. KEYNES, director of the Institute of Animal Physiology, Babraham, Cambridge.

Committee on Drug Addiction

At the first meeting in London on 12 January of the Advisory Committee on Drug Dependence, set up last October (see B.M.J., 5 November, p. 1147), Miss ALICE BACON, Minister of State, Home Office, announced that Sir EDWARD WAYNE had been appointed chairman in place of LORD BRAIN, who died in December. Sir Edward is Regius Professor of the Practice of Medicine at Glasgow University. He is a past chairman of the British Pharmacopoeia Commission and is chairman of the B.M.A. Committee on Alcohol and Road Accidents.

Sir Arnold France Opens New Hospital

About £75m. will be spent on hospital building in the current year, and for the next 10 years programmes will be based on an average annual expenditure of £100m., said Sir Arnold France, permanent secretary to the Ministry of Health, last week. That would mean spending over 30% above the current level, and in real terms more than double the highest level of capital investment in hospitals achieved this century in Britain up to the last war. If economic circumstances permitted a greater expansion than that now being planned, he was sure the Ministry and hospital authorities would be prepared and anxious to play a full part in speeding up the building programme.

Sir Arnold was opening the first stage of the major redevelopment scheme for Hillingdon Hospital, near Uxbridge, Middlesex. It provides 210 beds and all the supporting services for the 800-bed hospital it will eventually become. Facilities include an accident and emergency department. The total contract fund for this stage, with equipment, amounts to approximately £34m.

Medical Termination of Pregnancy Bili

A campaign to draw public attention to what it considers to be the dangers inherent in sections of Mr. DAVID STEEL'S Bill on abortion, now at the committee stage, is being planned by the Society for the Protection of Unborn Children. The chairman is LORD BARRINGTON. Other members of the committee include Mr. ALECK BOURNE, Sir Andrew Claye, Professor Ian Donald, Professor J. C. McClure Browne, Dr. ROBERT NEWTON, Professor JAMES SCOTT, and three members of Parliament: Mr. J. HILEY (Conservative), Mr. A. MACKENZIE (Liberal), and Mr. G. OAKES (Labour).

The society makes the following observa-

- 1. The Bill would confuse the law. Doctors would be required to make decisions on non-medical grounds for which they have no specialist training.
- There is no evidence that more readily available legal abortions would reduce the number of back-street abortions.
- 3. Therapeutic abortion, even carried out in ideal hospital conditions, is much more dangerous than normal childbirth.
- 4. Only in very few cases can doctors diagnose abnormalities in the unborn with any degree of stages of pregnancy.

 5. Supporters of the Bill pay too little attention
- to the great advances being made in preventive and curative medicine.
- 6. The most modern scientific evidence goes to prove that the foetus from the moment of conception is not only a human being but an individual with particular characteristics of its own.

A public protest meeting, organized by this society, is being held on 24 January at Caxton Hall, London.

Amendments to the Bill tabled by Mr. N. St. John-Stevas, Conservative member for Chelmsford, would delete the proposals that abortion should be authorized if there is a substantial risk that the child would be born

deformed; that the pregnant woman's capacity as a mother would be severely overstrained by the care of a child; and that abortion would be allowed if a pregnant woman is a defective, or became pregnant while under the age of 16, or as a result of rape. He has put down an amendment to include a conscience clause. It would provide that no doctor, nurse, hospital employee, or any other person should be required to take part in an abortion to which they have a conscientious objection. Another clause would require that in all cases the consent of the mother to an abortion should be given in writing and that, for a married woman, the consent of her husband should also be given in writing if he is the father of the child.

The Abortion Law Reform Association has issued a statement commenting on the joint views of the British Medical Association and the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (Brit. med. 7., 1966, 2, 1649). It supports Clauses 1 (1) (c) and (d) of Mr. Steel's Bill, which the B.M.A. and R.C.O.G. found "objectionable." And it opposes their view that abortion should be carried out only by a consultant and only in a National Health hospital or other place approved by the Minister.


Association of Physicians of Malaysia

Overseas Students in U.K. Universities

The Association of Commonwealth Universities has recently published a leaflet ("Students from Other Countries in United Kingdom Universities") giving details of the numbers of overseas students, from Commonwealth and other countries, enrolled for fulltime study or research in United Kingdom universities during the academic year 1965-6.

From the figures given the following facts emerge about the numbers of medical students from overseas attending United Kingdom medical schools during this period. The total number of undergraduate students from Commonwealth countries attending medical schools in this country was 651, this figure including 60 students from Ghana, 51 from Kenya, 60 from Malaysia (including Malaya, Sabah, and Sarawak), and 102 from Nigeria, together with smaller numbers from many of the other Commonwealth countries. The total number of undergraduates from countries outside the Commonwealth was 204, this figure including 30 students from Norway, 22 from Persia, 38 from South Africa, and 22 from the United States of America. The total number of overseas postgraduate medical students at United Kingdom universities was 445 from Commonwealth countries (making an overall total of 1,096 medical students from the Commonwealth), and 350 from the countries outside the Commonwealth (making an overall total for these countries of 554 students). number of graduate students from the Commonwealth countries includes 79 from Australia, 96 from India, and 69 from Pakistan. The figure for the countries out-

side the Commonwealth includes 54 from Egypt, 33 from the Republic of Ireland, 31 from South Africa, and 29 from the U.S.A.
