#### Westminster Hospital Installs Computer

Mr. KENNETH ROBINSON, Minister of Health, officially opened on 24 May the Page Street wing of Westminster Hospital. The new wing provides space for professorial units and specialized services, and is designed to ease co-operation between medical staffs. A new department has been established to run a computer centre. The installation at Westminster will be used chiefly to investigate the potentiality of computers in clinical medicine. In his speech the Minister said that the advanced equipment now available should ensure that the hospital continued to be in the forefront of medical progress. The cost of the project, including equipment, would exceed £24m.
