went on; and there was some evidence that smoking by parents might increase the risk of respiratory illness in infants in their first year of life.

Professor of Mental Health, Belfast

Dr. G. W. Fenton has been appointed to the chair of mental health, Queen's University of Belfast. Dr. Fenton, who is 44, was educated at Ballymena Academy and Queen's University of Belfast, where he graduated in 1954. After house appointments in Belfast, Glasgow, and London, Dr. Fenton became research assistant in the academic department of psychiatry at the Middlesex Hospital, and in 1964 was appointed lecturer. In 1967 he became senior lecturer in the Institute of Psychiatry and consultant psychiatrist and neurophysiologist at the Bethlem Royal and Maudsley hospitals. Dr. Fenton gained his D.P.M. in M.R.C.P. (Edinburgh) in 1960, 1957, M.R.C.P. (London) in 1963, and M.R.C. Psych. in 1971. In 1974 he was elected F.R.C.P. (Edinburgh).

Reciprocal Health Agreements

Britain now has reciprocal agreements for urgent medical treatment of foreign visitors on the same terms as their own nationals with Austria, Bulgaria, Denmark, Federal Gibraltar, Malta, Norway, Germany, Romania, Sweden, the U.S.S.R., and Yugoslavia. A similar agreement covers the countries of the E.E.C. British citizens in New Zealand are entitled to free treatment. Listing these agreements last week in a written Parliamentary answer, Dr. David Owen said that comprehensive information about the medical services in other countries was not readily available.
