Corrections

The results of the survey of off-duty time carried out in the North-eastern Region in Scotland, referred to by Dr. G. M. McAndrew at the meeting of the Hospital Junior Staffs Group Council (Scotland), were incorrectly given in the report in the *Supplement* (9 March, p. 68). The figures should have been: number of questionnaire forms issued, 159; number returned, 87; number showing recommended off-duty received, 23. After excluding anaesthetics and psychiatric staff: number of forms returned, 66; number showing recommended off-duty received, 9.

Air Vice-Marshal J. S. Wilson was incorrectly reported (*Supplement*, 9 March, p. 63) as informing the Council that "three out of ten" doctors in the Services were employed entirely on clinical work. What he said was "the vast majority." He has since stated that 11 out of 12 Service doctors are in clinical work.
