

ment should be limited to women who are not yet sensitized, have no living child, and are shown to have received enough foetal cells to make sensitization likely. The immunoglobulin must be given within 36 hours of delivery to be effective, so it is recommended that women at risk should be admitted to hospital for confinement. Doctors are asked to encourage patients known to be sensitized to the D antigen to become donors.
