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the department of ophthalmology, Harvard Membership Questions University. In 1963 he was appointed consultant ophthalmic surgeon to St. George's Hospital, London. Professor Phillips's main research interests are intraocular pressure, glaucoma, microsurgery, and hereditary diseases.

New Professor of Paediatrics

Dr. Victor Dubowitz has been appointed to the chair of paediatrics tenable at the Institute of Child Health attached to the Royal Postgraduate Medical School, London, from

October. Dr. Dubowitz, who is 40, completed his schooling in Beaufort West, South Africa, and qualified from Cape Town University in 1954. After house appointments at the Groote Schuur Hospital and a short spell in general practice he came to England



in 1956 and held appointments Lewisham Hospital and New End Hospital in London and Queen Mary's Hospital for Children, Carshalton, where he developed an interest in neuromuscular disorders. He became research fellow at the Royal Postgraduate Medical School in 1958 and lecturer in clinical pathology at the National Hospital for Nervous Diseases in 1960. He was appointed lecturer in child health at Sheffield University in 1961, senior lecturer and consultant paediatrician in 1965 and reader in child health and developmental neurology in 1967. In 1965-6 he was research associate at the Institute for Muscle Disease, New York. His main publications have been on neuromuscular disorders and the neurological maturation of the fetus and newborn.

Training for General Practice

The Council for Postgraduate Medical Education in England and Wales has recommended that all doctors entering general practice should undertake at least three years' training after full registration before appointment as a principal. The council pointed out last week when announcing this recommendation that it accepts a five-year period (as recommended by the Royal Commission on Medical Education) as the ultimate aim but that in present circumstances three years is more realistic.
