London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine department of community health

The competition is open to registered undergraduate medical students of any school in the United Kingdom, at any stage of the curriculum, and will be assessed by a panel appointed by the Trust, which hopes to announce the results of the first competition in June 1981. Essays should be accompanied by a covering letter stating the full name and address of the author, the medical school that he or she is attending, and the stage of the curriculum that he or she has reached.
