First chair of nuclear medicine

The University of London has recently established the first chair of nuclear medicine in the United Kingdom, tenable in the Department of Nuclear Medicine, University College and Middlesex School of Medicine. Dr P J Ell has been appointed to the chair from 1 October 1987.

New stock

There will be a new accident and emergency department and improved supporting diagnostic services.
