of preregistration posts. It was held that they should be held within the curtilage of the medical school, and it was to be hoped that they would be planned so that no time would be wasted between appointments. By curtilage he meant something a little wider than the actual building, so that preregistration posts could exist in peripheral hospitals but within the field of activities of the medical school.

There had been some difference of opinion, said Dr. Maggs, on who should set the standards of training, and he thought that that should be the function of the Royal Colleges. A doctor on qualification should have a reasonable chance of finding a post within his capacity in which he could function effectively. To achieve that there would have to be an efficient personal advisory service. Dr. Maggs said he was also concerned about the suggestion that some hospitals might be graded according to the training facilities they offered. Training posts should exist only in hospitals where full training facilities were available.

Mr. Shipman said he thought it was wrong that a doctor should "qualify" and then have to do another three years training and pass another examination before he could be on the vocational register. To ask a man to qualify twice was ridiculous. "If you do not think a man is ready to practise don't qualify him," he said.

The CHAIRMAN said that no decision had yet been made on a further examination. The next stage would be recommendations from the Royal Colleges when they had seen what the General Medical Council had in mind.

Dr. CAMERON said that vocational training in general practice was a new concept, and it must come about in phases. In his opinion, the preregistration period plus a further three years, two of them spent in general practice, seemed a reasonable time. In the European Community each country was now in the process of agreeing to standards of vocational training which would apply over the whole community.

The Committee agreed by a large majority that there should be a period of vocational training after prime qualification. No decision was reached on what the period should

The recommendations of the joint subcommittee were adopted.

Overseas Doctors

The Committee considered a draft Department of Health hospital circular on making the attachment scheme for overseas doctors The Secretary of State had compulsory. announced in July (B.M.J., 2 August, p. 307) that he had decided to make assessment under the scheme compulsory before a doctor could enter hospital employment, subject to exemptions for certain groups of doctors for whom the requirement would be inappropriate.

After some discussion, in which doubts were expressed about the practicability of the scheme, the Committee accepted the principle of compulsory attachment for overseas medical graduates, but found the draft memorandum unacceptable.
