scheme is designed primarily for the owner whose herd is free, or relatively free, of brucellosis, and who is willing to seek and retain voluntary registration of his herd ahead of the compulsory area eradication programme which will start in 1971.

New M.R.C. Appointment

The Medical Research Council has appointed Dr. D. A. J. TYRRELL F.R.S. as deputy director of its Clinical Research Centre at Northwick Park. He succeeds Professor RICHARD DOLL, F.R.S., and Dr. Tyrrell will continue in his present post as head of the Division of Communicable Diseases at the Centre. Dr. Tyrrell is 45 and qualified in medicine at the University of Sheffield in 1948, receiving his basic training



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in clinical and laboratory medicine there. From 1951-4 he was at the Rockefeller Institute Hospital, New York, and then joined the Council's external scientific staff to work at the University of Sheffield Virus Research Laboratory. In 1957 he transferred to the Cold Common

Research Unit at Salisbury, and in 1961 he was appointed director of the World Health Organization Virus Reference Laboratory at the Unit. Since 1967, when he became head of the Division of Communicable Diseases. he has divided his time between work at the West Hendon Hospital, at the Council's laboratories at Mill Hill, and at the Common Cold Research Unit. Dr. Tyrrell has gained international recognition for his work on the systematic identification and classification of respiratory viruses. His studies have been particularly concerned with the aetiology of the common cold and development of experimental vaccines.

Chair of Pathology, Glasgow

Dr. R. B. GOUDIE has been appointed to the St. Mungo-Notman chair of pathology, Glasgow University, in succession to Professor T. SYMINGTON who is now director of the Institute of Cancer Research.



Dr. Goudie was educated at Hutchesons' Boys' Grammar School Glasgow and University where he graduated M.B., Ch.B., with honours, and was Brunton memorial prizewinner in 1951. Following national service as а medical officer in the Royal Air Force

he has been lecturer, senior lecturer and reader in pathology at the Western Infirmary, Glasgow. During his tenure of a Nuffield fellowship he worked with J. R. Marrack in Cambridge. He holds the M.R.C.P. London, and Glasgow, and is a founder member of the Royal College of Pathologists. In 1967

he was awarded M.D. with honours and the Bellahouston gold medal for a thesis on autoimmune diseases of the thyroid and adrenal. Dr. Goudie has also been interested in the immunopathology of disorders of the liver and of the connective tissues.

Chair of Biochemistry, Dundee

Dr. P. B. GARLAND has been appointed to the chair of biochemistry at Dundee University. Dr. Garland, aged 36, graduated from



Cambridge, M.B., B.Chir. in 1958 Ph.D. and in 1964. Since then held he has successively the posts of lecturer and reader in biochemistry at Bristol University. During 1969 he was the visiting professor at the Johnson Research Foundation

Pennsylvania University. His current research interests include biogenesis of intracellular membranes and bioenergetics.

Lister Institute

In its annual report for 1969 the Lister Institute records its appreciation of the many bodies which provided financial support, in particular Arthur Guinness, Son & Co. Ltd., and the Fleming Memorial Fund for Medical Research. Work on trypanosomiasis, whooping cough, cholera, and clostridial toxins is reported. Other studies in microbiology concerned mycoplasma infections and inheritance in bacteria, with gene transfer and drug resistance in vibrio cholerae as particular areas of research.

In virology, researches were continued into the possible role of adenovirus type 5 in infectious hepatitis, and hypersensitivity and immunity to vaccinia virus was another continuing study. The Institute's extensive work also included clinical trials of antirhesus factor antibodies, mechanisms of infection and defence, permeability of liver cells, and a number of projects by the Electron Microscope Unit which has been supported by a £35,000 grant from the Fleming Memorial Fund.
