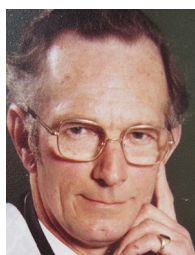




OBITUARIES

Kenneth Haddon Trigg

Kenneth Haddon Trigg served with the Royal Artillery in the Far East in the second world war. He was captured and held as a prisoner of war in Borneo for three and a half years. He trained after his liberation and worked as a family doctor in Merstham until 1986. An active member of the Royal College of GPs, he established his local vocational training scheme and served as provost of the South West Thames faculty.

He was precise and meticulous and had a great appreciation of things of beauty and craftsmanship. He was well read and had many interests, including woodwork, photography, music, and horticulture. He wrote with a distinctive italic script.

He met his wife, Sylvia, at King's. They married after they had both qualified in 1955. Two of their four professional children followed them into medicine. He leaves Sylvia, four children, and three grandchildren.
