New Chairman of M.R.C.

The Duke of Northumberland has accepted an invitation to be the next Chairman of the Medical Research Council. He will take office when LORD AMORY, who has been Chairman of the M.R.C. since 1965, retires on 30 September 1969. The Duke of Northumberland was Chairman of the Agricultural Research Council from 1958 until July 1968, and has been Chancellor of the University of Newcastle since 1964.

Sherman Fund

The Welsh Council has decided to establish a prize (100 guineas) to be awarded annually for the most significant contribution published in the medical journals in the United Kingdom arising from work carried out in Wales by a registered medical practitioner. The prize, named the B.M.A. Sherman Prize, will be awarded on the basis of work published between 1 January and 31 December. Authors are invited to submit reprints in the first instance to the Area Secretary, B.M.A. Welsh House, 195 Newport Road, Cardiff.

Applications are also invited from doctors engaged in research in Wales who need financial assistance to further their research. They should give details of the proposed project and specify the extent of the financial assistance required.

British Committee for Standards in Haematology

The British Committee for Standards in Haematology is to launch a scheme for interlaboratory quality control of haematological tests. At intervals various reference preparations will be distributed to participating laboratories, while the "true" results will be determined in reference laboratories. The results from the participants will be evaluated statistically; acceptable limits of accuracy and precision will be established; and the results of each trial will be reported in confidence to the individual participants. Initially the scheme will be available only to a limited number of laboratories, but it is planned to expand the scheme to all areas in the United Kingdom. Applications to take part are invited from consultant haematologists in charge of laboratories. Inquiries should be addressed to Dr. S. M.
