(3) Second and subsequent editions of textbooks are eligible only if they have been substantially rewritten so as to constitute a new work. (4) "Medical textbook" is defined as a book intended for doctors, medical students, or the caring professions. ### Unique chair at King's College London

King's College London has established a chair in medical law and ethics—the first of its kind in Britain. The new professor is Ian McColl Kennedy, who took up his post on 1 October.

### Medical student electives

The Commonwealth Foundation invites applications for bursaries from senior medical students of approved medical schools in the Commonwealth, to help them to spend their elective period in a Commonwealth country other than their own, between 1 June 1984 and 31 May 1985. Six further bursaries are being offered by the Edward Boyle Memorial Trust. Applications for both sets of bursaries

should be submitted in the first instance to the dean of the candidate's medical school. Deans may then recommend up to two candidates from each medical school.

### Psychosocial oncology group

A multidisciplinary group dealing with the psychological aspects of cancer has recently been set up. One of the aims of the group is to set up a register of people who are concerned with patients with cancer, whether through their research or clinical contact, who have a specific interest in social and psychological factors affecting patients. ### Bulk sweetening agents

Several new food sweeteners are to be introduced in the near future. These include three new bulk sweetening agents, and so the full list of such agents contained in food will be sorbitol, mannitol, xylitol, hydrogenated glucose syrup, and isomalt. These substances are polyhydric alcohols and may cause flatulence and diarrhoea. Some food manufacturers are voluntarily labelling their products, informing the consumer of their laxative potential. The Committee on Toxicity has, however, recommended that all doctors and pharmacists should be aware that patients complaining of flatulence and diarrhoea may have consumed an unusual amount of bulk sweeteners in their food.

### Queen Charlotte's Hospital

Queen Charlotte's Maternity Hospital and the Chelsea Hospital for Women are to be managed by the Hammersmith Special Health Authority, which is to be renamed the Hammersmith and Queen Charlotte's Special Health Authority. (Until now Queen Charlotte's has been run by its own board of

governors.) The Minister for Health, Mr Kenneth Clarke, said, "This decision on management does not in itself affect service provision. There is, however, an urgent need for a strategic review of obstetric services in west London. I am asking the North West Thames Regional Health Authority to take the lead in developing a new strategy in consultation with the special health authority and the district health authorities concerned."
