Joint Commercial and Medical Screening Project

In return for a cytology screening service for their 30,000 women employees on a research basis, Marks & Spencer's Ltd. have financed the building of an extension to the cytology unit at St. Stephen's Hospital, Chelsea. The new extension, which was opened on 22 October by the joint vice-chairman of Marks & Spencer's, Mr. Marcus J. Sieff, will provide cervical cytology facilities for the hospital and local general practitioners as well as being used as a central laboratory for Marks & Spencer's. It is hoped that the project will provide an opportunity for studying the natural history of dysplasia and carcinoma of the cervix as well as research into the most economical methods of providing this service.

Offices and Shops Accidents

Accidents in offices, shops and railway premises total 19,018 in 1969, according to a report issued by the Secretary of State for Employment and Productivity. Twenty of these were fatal, a fall of nearly 50% as compared with 1968. A high proportion of the accidents reported to the Department under the 1963 Act were due to carelessness. Falls continued to be the biggest single cause, comprising 37% of total accidents.
